Common Sense for the 99%

Where have all the dollars gone?

The richest 1% were getting about 23% of our national income leading up to the 2008 crash. The last time they got that big a slice (1929), the Great Depression hit. When our economy grew steadily (1945-1975), those 1% only took in about 10% of the national income. Just that *extra* money that the 1% now take runs about \$15,000 per year for every American household.

Taxes on the highest incomes ran 70% to 92% from 1945-1975, when our economy grew best, when we built the roads and bridges we still use today. Now the richest often pay less than 20%. Wall Street whines about even that.

Layoffs are hitting teachers, bus drivers, firefighters, nurses, and other essential public employees. Keeping those jobs is more important than tax breaks for the rich.

We need jobs building new energy and transportation systems for America. We need housing and schools. People are out of work now. What are we waiting for?

To get back on track, we need to control the banksters, regulating them again. We need to return to fair taxes on the rich, closing their loopholes. We need to give unions a fair chance to organize again for fair pay and benefits, instead of tilting the playing field for the corporations.

Our health care costs about twice as much per person as any other country's, at least *an extra* \$3000 per person per year. About \$1000 of that is pure waste due to inefficient private insurance. 50 million people don't have coverage. About a million per year are driven to bankruptcy by illness. The new healthcare law covers another 30 million, but doesn't go far enough.. We need something like Medicare- a program that really works- available to everyone. Instead, Congressional Republicans voted to replace Medicare with a skimpy private voucher plan.

The wars in the Middle East have cost an average family well over \$10,000 so far. We need to end those wars and spend the money on jobs at home- say to get clean renewable domestic energy.
